## Investigative Services

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The Investigative Services branch of the Memphis Police Department is responsible for thoroughly reviewing the details surrounding every crime committed in Memphis. Investigative Services work closely with all branches of the Memphis Police Department and other law enforcement agencies to solve crime.

### Crime Scene Investigation

The Crime Scene Investigation Unit is a full-time operational unit responsible for conducting on-site investigations at the scenes of violent crimes (homicides, sex crimes, robberies, aggravated assaults, and missing persons), and property crimes (burglaries, auto thefts, and thefts or destruction of property over \$10,000). CSI also handles any follow-up investigative requests for which CSI services are needed to process, collect, preserve, package, transport, analyze, and document physical and/or trace evidence that will assist in the successful investigation and prosecution of offenders committing crimes in Memphis. CSI is a support unit to all bureaus within Investigative Services and provides training to regional law enforcement personnel in the area of crime scene investigations. In 2014, CSI responded to 4,512 radio calls, initiated 14,912 specials, handled 4,261 scenes, and processed 1,345 vehicles. CSI also participated in 6 Citizen's police academy events, 10 demonstrations, 5 facility tours, and facilitated numerous training events for regional law enforcement agencies.

### Domestic Violence

The Domestic Violence Unit (DV) is responsible for investigating incidents involving domestic violence. The DV Unit works closely with the Citizen's Dispute Office and the Shelby County Sheriff's Office regarding Domestic Violence warrants and protective orders. In 2014, the DV Unit reviewed 17,945 cases which included 1,493 aggravated assaults and 10,699 simple assaults.

### Economic Crimes

The Economic Crimes Bureau is responsible for the investigation and prosecution of individuals involved in felony crimes. Crimes investigated include forgeries, counterfeit checks, counterfeit credit and debit cards, computer fraud, insurance fraud, and various other forms of financial institution fraud. In 2014, Economic Crime Investigators handled 4,905 cases, made 504 total arrests and had a 13.2% clearance rate.

### Felony Response

Felony Response handles preliminary investigations of all types of crime classifications. Offenses investigated include: rape, homicide, robbery, burglary, and larceny. In 2014, Felony Response handled 4,350 calls and 2,017 arrests.

### Homicide

The Homicide Bureau is responsible for conducting all investigations related to homicides, suicides, and natural or accidental deaths. Memphis recorded 168 homicides in 2014 compared to 150 in 2013. The Homicide Bureau was able to clear 77% of all homicides in 2014 while the national average is 64.1%. Homicide also made 106 arrests and investigated 2,604 cases.

### Missing Persons

The Missing Persons Unit handles all cases involving missing persons and runaways. During 2014, Missing Persons Investigators handled 3,422 cases. Of those cases, 822 were missing persons and 2,214 were runaways.

### Pawn/Scrap/Seizure

Pawn, Scrap, Seizure Unit investigates person(s) responsible for thefts of scrap metals, monitor and identify frequent pawners, recovers stolen property, assist outside agencies, and assist investigators in creating a deterrent for criminals by seizing vehicles that were used conveyance of felony crimes. Pawn, Scrap, Seizure Unit handled 822 assigned scrap cases, 468 pawn pickups, 1802 items seized at value of \$420,567, and made 37 arrests during 2014. The clearance rate for the Pawn Scrap Seizure Unit's total case load was 22.21% in 2014.

## Sex Crimes/Juvenile Abuse

This unit is responsible for handling investigations involving any sexual or physically abusive crime. In 2014, the Sex Crimes/Juvenile Abuse Squad reviewed 1,840 total cases which included 350 rapes, 278 occurrences of forcible fondling, and 113 stalking complaints with 608 arrests.

## Vehicle Storage

The City of Memphis Vehicle Storage is located at 465 Klink Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee. The Vehicle Storage lot operates seven (7) days a week, 24 hours per day. Vehicle Storage processes vehicles that are brought to the facility by the authority of the Memphis Police Department (MPD), the Shelby County Sheriff's Department, or Housing and Community Development (HCD). During 2014, Vehicle Storage impounded 9,045 vehicles, released 6,643 vehicles, and sold 2,338 vehicles at auction.



## General Investigative

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The General Investigation Bureau will investigate felony and misdemeanor crimes that require investigation including but not limited to vehicle thefts, assaults, burglaries, and robberies.

## Motors

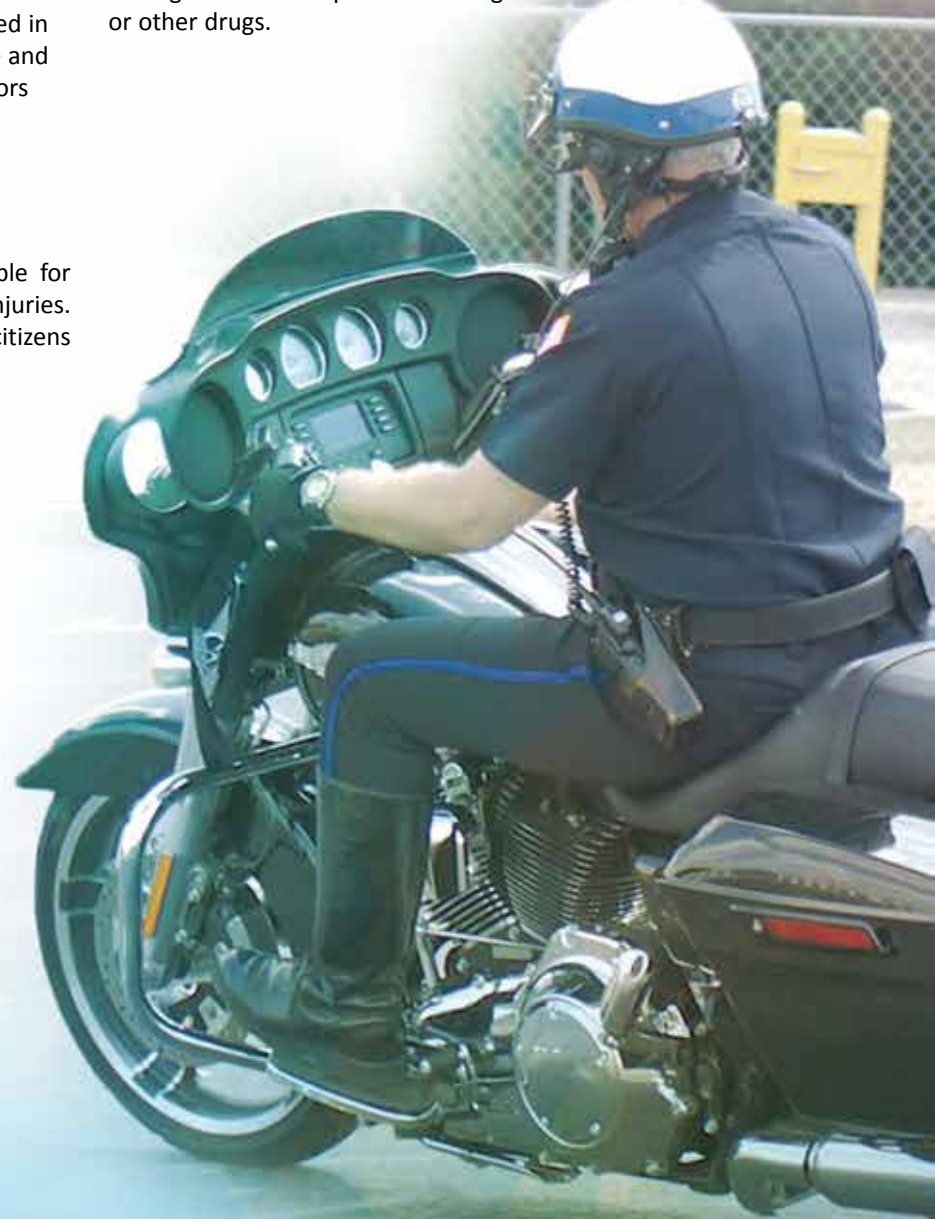
The primary function of Motors is the enforcement of traffic laws, the investigation of crashes and the participation in special events. Motors, as well as other members of the Traffic Division, are periodically assigned as traffic control for major movies filmed in Memphis which have included the films “21 Grams”, “Hustle and Flow”, “Black Snake Moan” and “My Blueberry Nights”. Motors Officers utilize twenty-eight (27) motorcycles.

## STIS

The Special Traffic Investigations Squad (STIS) is responsible for investigating crashes involving fatalities or serious critical injuries. STIS is also responsible for investigating crashes involving citizens over the age of 85.

## DUI

The DUI Unit responds to calls in the city involving alcohol or drug related incidents. MPD DUI officers are specially trained in the testing of drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol or other drugs.

## Special Services

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The Memphis Police Department provides specialized police services through Special Operations. The services are not only utilized by the Memphis Police Department but also regional law enforcement agencies.

### Air Support

The Air Support Division is often utilized by MPD units and outside agencies in various types of operations. Helicopters flown by Air Support include three Bell Jet Ranger helicopters and a Eurocopter A-Star helicopter. Staffed 16 hours a day, this high flying unit handled 329 calls for service in 2014 and was instrumental in 47 arrests and handled 44 assist-other-agency calls.

### Bomb Unit

The Bomb Unit responded to 37 call outs in 2014. The Bomb Unit also participated in 9 VIP security details, 6 lectures, 48 miscellaneous incidents, 2 static displays, 40 training events.

### Canine Unit

This unit utilizes highly trained dogs who, along with their handlers, make up a unique team responsible for building searches and suspect searches, as well as narcotic and explosive detection. In 2014, the Canine Unit answered 1,882 calls, initiated 12,388 specials, and made 311 arrests.

### Harbor Patrol

This unit is responsible for the safety and enforcement of marine activities along the Mississippi River. The unit has three vessels in its fleet and officers assigned to the unit are responsible for ensuring daily that the vessels are ready to put into service. During 2014, the officers assigned to the Harbor Patrol handled 22 calls, 8 call-outs, 30 details, 71 boat checks, 2 calls from other agencies; issued 60 warnings, handled 15 boat assists, and 1,779 specials.

### Mounted Patrol

Mounted Patrol provides assistance with crowd control, traffic control and providing positive community relations. In 2014, the staffing of Mounted Patrol consisted of 1 Lieutenant, 1 Sergeant, 5 Patrolman, and 2 Reserve Patrolmen. As a unit, the Mounted Patrol officers and their 7 mounts handled 73 community details, worked 66 patrol assignments, attended 66 training sessions and initiated 2,449 specials.

### Officers in the Schools

The Officers in the Schools (OIS) Program assigns officers to 13 High Schools. The officers assigned to the Memphis City Schools serve as mentors and leaders, as well as volunteer their time for civic groups, scouting troops, and various youth sports leagues. The Memphis Police Department OIS has reported a total of 83 arrests, issued 944 non-moving and moving tickets and confiscated 2 guns and 1 cutting instruments in 2014.

### Reserve Officers

The Memphis Police Reserve Division was formed in 1968 due to the critical shortage of law enforcement manpower; budget restrictions and a need to help hold back the surge of crime inflicted upon the citizens of this community. Reserve Officers are still upholding the proud tradition after 42 years of service to our community. The total number of 106 reserves worked 22,245 total hours for the year 2014.

# Tact Unit

This elite unit, specially trained to respond to various emergency situations, is responsible for handling barricade situations, hostage rescues, counter-terrorism, and high risk felony apprehensions. Although not subject to regular calls for service like patrol units, the Tact Unit responded to 471 radio calls, initiated 10,859 specials, made 90 arrests, issued 866 tickets, and handled 5 barricade/hostage situations in 2014. The TACT Unit also participated in 8 VIP Security Details, 16 Community Outreach programs, and 3 gun seizures.



## Training Academy

The Memphis Police Academy provides training programs that vary from civilian training to basic and in-service training for commissioned officers.

Basic recruit training consists of 840 hours of training that focuses on the enhancement of knowledge, skills, and proficiency in firearms, tactical and behavioral law enforcement theories necessary for the appointment to a commissioned status.

- Commendation Committee reviewed individual cases (TOP COP included) for awards that would be given at the commendations ceremony in 2015.
- Commendation Staff reviewed recommendations that would be issued at workstation roll calls.

## Training

- 2172 Memphis Police Officers and 55 Reserve Officers completed In-Service Training

## Employment Unit

- Recruiting Unit made 25 recruiting trips in an effort to increase the number of qualified police applicants. A total of 703 were personally contacted.
- Posters were placed in churches, colleges/university, military bases, and diverse organizations.
- Appearances were made on Hispanic Radio Internet Network and Local Hispanic Radio Stations.
- The web site, [mpdacademy.com](http://mpdacademy.com), was updated reflecting upcoming testing dates and contact information.
- Public Service Announcements (PSAs) were broadcasted on radio and TV stations, local newspaper, and Latino Memphis Facebook page.
- A new recruiting plan was implemented to allow qualified patrol officers to participate in the recruiting effort.
- Background Unit conducted and completed a total of 1612 background investigations.
- The databases were constantly updated in order to better generate reports, accountability, and statistics reflecting true oversight of the unit in recruiting and background investigations.
- The standard operating procedures (SOP) was updated and standardized to reflect the current guidelines of the unit.
- A background investigation training manual was updated and standardized.

## D.A.R.E./ G.R.E.A.T.

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The D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit has continued to provide services with emphasis on “DRUGS” and “GANGS” awareness, prevention and resistance. The Office of Drug Education D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit is currently staffed with one Lieutenant, seven Officers. All officers are trained and certified in D.A.R.E. and G.R.E.A.T. The D.A.R.E. / G.R.E.A.T. curriculums were taught in (29) Fifty-six Elementary schools, and (18) eighteen middle schools.

Along with teaching the D.A.R.E. /G.R.E.A.T. curriculums, the unit held the G.R.E.A.T. Summer Day Camps, which consisted of two camps (49 participants). The camps were held Monday-Friday 8:00am to 4:00pm.

The officers were responsible for the well being and safety of the children. All of the camps concluded without incident and the officer did an outstanding job. The Office of Drug Education participated in numerous Health Fairs, Community Days, Red Ribbon Week, Career Days, and Gang presentations and displays. The D.A.R.E. /G.R.E.A.T. unit held two Citywide culminations for D.A.R.E. which consisted of (29) Twenty-nine participating schools, culminating 2,226 students. There were 18 G.R.E.A.T. culminations and a Citywide Culmination which consisted of (18) eighteen participating schools, culminating 2,795 students.



## Part One Crimes by Precinct

Part One Crimes are made up of seven offenses: homicide, burglary, robbery, vehicle theft, aggravated assault, rape, and larceny. The FBI tabulates the total number of Part One Crimes committed per city to calculate the crime index for cities in the United States. These statistics are published in their yearly Uniform Crime Report (UCR).

- Personal Crimes are homicide, robbery, aggravated assault, and rape.
- Property Crimes are burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft (MVT).

The Memphis Police Department is 100% compliant with National Incident Based Reporting (NIBRS).

# Information Systems

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## Mission Statement

The mission of MPD's Information Technology Division is to optimize the Department's ability to protect and serve the citizens of Memphis through the efficient and innovative use of the most advanced Information Technology (IT) available. Challenges include identifying which technologies should be incorporated to achieve the greatest public safety benefit. Responsibilities include planning, developing, implementing, and supporting the IT systems and networks throughout the Police Division.

Law enforcement requires timely and secure access to services that provide data whenever and wherever for deterring and reducing crime. The exchange of criminal justice information is governed by 28 C.F.R., part 20. The MPD Information Technology Division is responsible for this agency's compliance to the CJIS Security Policy and the Management Control Agreement.

## Accomplishments for 2014

- Information Systems migrated all MPD users from the antiquated, NT4 Memphis Police domain to a more robust CJIS compliant domain (MEM RTCC domain).
- Updated the paperless Watson reporting suite from a Windows PC platform to the Android platform that allows for greater functionality.
- Completed the Tri-Tech RMS upgrade
- Implementation of the new Cyber Watch Program
- Institute the (ACES) Automated Case Examination Service Investigative Protocol
- Added cameras to our Port Security Program
- Additional Sky Cop & Sky Watch surveillance platforms

## 2015 Information Systems Goals

- The Memphis Police Department will deploy a Law Enforcement Event Video Documentation (LEEVD) System Solution. The LEEVD System will be comprised of recording equipment mounted on the vehicle, In-Car (ICV); worn on the officer, Body Worn Camera (BWC); and, equipment to document the spatial and physical characteristics of the vehicle, Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL); the data storage facilities; and, the backend software application to securely categorize, manage, retrieve, share and archive the video evidence and related data collected during Memphis Police Department (MPD) activities.



**The 2014 enforcement efforts of C.O.P. were the following:**

254 felony arrests, 351 misdemeanor arrests, issued 1,361 misdemeanor citations, 38 Juvenile Summons, 7,263 moving citations, recovered 21 guns/weapons, answered 780 calls for service, initiated 24,534 specials, took 405 reports, seized \$17,257, completed 478 program requests, and conducted 408 door to door citizen contacts.

**The following information highlights some of the results generated from Crime Prevention's 2014 community programs that emphasize intervention and prevention education:**

- 152 citizens graduated from the Citizen Police Academy,
- 47 clergy graduated from the Clergy Police Academy,
- Issued 300 coats purchased by Zach Randolph to students of Larose and Hawkins Mill Elementary Schools during,
- 100 youth participated in the "Outside the Box" summer boxing/mentoring program,
- At least 400 students from 20 Shelby County Schools participated in the Youth Crime Watch Conference hosted at Oak Grove MB Church. The students were empowered with information on various crime topics they requested prior to the event. These youth returned to their respective schools, identified the crime issues and with the assistance of counselors and COP, implemented educational programs and events as possible solutions. A few guest speakers at this event were Director Toney Armstrong, Dr. Steven Charles, U of M Coach Josh Pastner, and Pastor Terrell Johnson.
- 609 teen and young adults participated in the COP Job Fair at Ed Rice Community Center
- Distributed at least 400 backpacks as well as school supplies,
- 500 attended the Gaston Community Center Health Fair,
- Interacted with hundreds of high school aged youth through the HOOPS Challenge basketball games and the "Real Talk" mentoring sessions,

- Organized and coached 75 high school youth who accounted for 15 teams to participate in the annual Black History Knowledge Bowl competition held at Booker T. Washington High School,
- 14 Youth participated in the first MPD's Youth Choir. Their first performance was at the Clergy Graduation held at 1st Baptist Church - Broad.
- 20 teams participated in the 1st Annual Feed the Needy Bowling tournament fundraiser at the Winchester Bowling Center. The funds aided with the delivery of 2,000 Thanksgiving food baskets in the annual Feed the Needy initiative. COP Officers delivered at least 200 of those Thanksgiving food baskets to local residents throughout the Memphis community,
- Mobilized over 500 motorcycle riders (along with 24 sponsors) to participate in the successful Motorcycle Awareness initiative at Tiger Lane,
- Distributed at least 1500 books for Mrs. Haslam's Read 20 Program,
- Handled over 400 program requests from schools, church groups, neighborhood watch groups, and other community groups to speak on public and personal safety concerns.

The Crime Prevention Unit was implemented in 2011 to create, organize, coordinate and manage all community-oriented and community outreach initiatives affiliated with the Memphis Police Department. The unit's largest program is the Community Outreach Program (C.O.P.). This initiative was developed utilizing the existing manpower from the former police Co-Act units. Its restructuring better serves the community relative to community policing and the reduction of juvenile violence.

Implemented March 10, 2012, the C.O.P. consists of approximately 60 officers and six (6) supervisors who are assigned designated target areas. These areas were identified from collected crime data with the assistance of University of Memphis. These officers address crime issues and community problems in the target areas through a three prong approach. Officers identify issues and problems by talking to citizens, completing surveys and reviewing crime data. After the appropriate enforcement is applied, prevention education is provided with the aid of community partners.
