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Since 2016, we have worked extremely hard to prioritize our resources to reduce violent crime throughout our city. In addition to adding more officers to the department, we also included another raise in pay in the FY20 budget. Our public safety employees are a key part of our city's continued progress. I am committed to recruiting and retaining quality officers, and I understand that this requires making the right investments to keep us competitive.

As we continue to move forward, we see and feel the great work that MPD is performing in our neighborhoods every single day with the good men and women of our department. I truly appreciate all that MPD does to improve the quality of life for all Memphians, every single day.

As Director of Police Services, I am honored to present the 2018 Annual Report on behalf of nearly 3,000 hardworking men and women of the Memphis Police Department. Without the fortitude and dedication of these employees, the Memphis Police Department would not be able to continue to reduce crime and strengthen our community-policing efforts throughout this great city. Their commitment to our community is nothing short of amazing, and for this, I am forever grateful. This Annual Report contains a summary of the department's accomplishments as well as a glimpse into each division's activities for the year. Please take a moment to review some of the highlights from your department.

Furthermore, I would like to extend my gratitude to the citizens of Memphis. Throughout 2018, the MPD experienced many challenges. Working within the law enforcement profession is ever evolving, and at times, it may seem as if it is a thankless job. However, the citizens of Memphis continue to support us and stand beside us regardless of the challenges. We understand the importance of teamwork and recognize without the support of our community; we cannot continue to be successful in our endeavor. The unwavering support from our citizens is the strength that each of us needs on a daily basis, for this, I thank you.

As you review this Annual Report, you will see first-hand that our partnerships with the citizens of Memphis, local and federal law enforcement agencies, our faith-based community, stakeholders, and educators are working. In 2018, through our Neighborhood Watch Program, 84 newly developed Neighborhood Watch Associations were established, bringing us to a total of 550 associations citywide. Additionally, through our Neighborhood Watch Crime Prevention Grant, over 158 associations have collectively applied for and received over \$380,000 to go toward additional crime-fighting initiatives. Crime Stoppers tips are also on the rise. After receiving 2,551 tips in 2018, 289 arrests were made; this proves that through a collaborative effort, we can make a difference.

Additionally, our recruiting efforts continue to attract qualified applicants. In 2018, 190 officers and 65 Police Service Technicians graduated from MPD's Training Academy, giving us a total of 255 new officers and PSTs. Of the 255, 222 (87%) came from our community, Memphis and Shelby County. The Memphis Police Department is one of the best departments in our nation, and our employees are

above all others. Through our robust recruiting initiatives and open lines of communication with those within our community, I foresee even more Memphians getting involved.

In 2016, I vowed to lead the men and women of the Memphis Police Department and provide the highest quality of police services to all persons within the City of Memphis. Two years later, I stand by my promise. MPD will continue to work diligently to protect and service the citizens of Memphis. We will continue to answer calls for service and build upon our community policing initiatives.

We will continue to combat crime and seek out those who choose to violate the law, and we will continue to represent the City of Memphis and its citizens with the utmost integrity.

Again, thank you to the men and women of the Memphis Police Department, and thank you to the citizens of Memphis. Together, we are making a difference, and we will continue to move forward for yet another year ensuring that Memphis remains to be the great city that we all know and love.

## Inspectional Services

Inspectional Services is made up of the Internal Affairs Squad and the Security Squad. Inspectional Services conducts all internal investigations involving police personnel, as well as, other sensitive investigations. Officers assigned to these units are appointed by the Director of Police and are considered to be highly experienced investigators. In 1996, the offices of Internal Affairs and Security Squad were relocated to the 100 North Main building, Suite 2220, in downtown Memphis. In December of 2006, IAB and Security Squad were moved once again to the corner of Poplar and Union Extended.

### Purpose of Internal Affairs

The purpose of the Internal Affairs Squad is to define responsibilities and establish procedures for sworn members of this department for dealing with observed or reported allegations of misconduct. Internal Affairs investigates all complaints lodged against police personnel. These complaints can range from verbal abuse to brutality. The majority of these complaints fall under three categories: Personal Conduct, Use of Force and Arrest, and Duty Performance.

The Security Squad investigates all shooting incidents involving police officers and any complaints regarding possible criminal misconduct against employees. These investigations include accusations against officers, city employees from various departments, and other administrative investigations.

The Security Squad is also responsible for teaching Deadly Force lectures at the Training Academy for new police recruits and during In-Service Training for veteran officers. Their Deadly Force lecture is also part of the training received by all citizens enrolled in the Citizen's Police Academy.

## Investigative Services

The Investigative Services branch of the Memphis Police Department is responsible for thoroughly reviewing the details surrounding every crime committed in Memphis. Investigative Services work closely with all branches of the Memphis Police Department and other law enforcement agencies to solve crime.

## Crime Scene Investigation

The Crime Scene Investigation Unit is a full-time operational unit responsible for conducting on-site investigations at the scenes of violent crimes (homicides, sex crimes, robberies, aggravated assaults, and missing persons), and property crimes (burglaries, auto thefts, and thefts or destruction of property over \$10,000). CSI also handles any follow-up investigative requests for which CSI services are needed to process, collect, preserve, package, transport, analyze, and document physical and/or trace evidence that will assist in the successful investigation and prosecution of offenders committing crimes in Memphis. CSI is a support unit to all bureaus within Investigative Services and provides training to regional law enforcement personnel in the area of crime scene investigations. In 2018, CSI responded to 5,052 radio calls, initiated 18,853 specials, handled 4,877 scenes, and processed 2,044 vehicles. CSI also participated in 4 Citizen's police academy events, 3 demonstrations, and facilitated numerous training events for regional law enforcement agencies.

## Domestic Violence

The Domestic Violence Unit (DV) is responsible for investigating incidents involving domestic violence. The DV Unit works closely with the Citizen's Dispute Office and the Shelby County Sheriff's Office regarding Domestic Violence warrants and protective orders. In 2018, the DV Unit reviewed 17,761 cases which included 1,885 aggravated assaults and 9,487 simple assaults.

## Economic Crimes

The Economic Crimes Bureau is responsible for the investigation and prosecution of individuals involved in felony crimes. Crimes investigated include forgeries, counterfeit checks, counterfeit credit and debit cards, computer fraud, insurance fraud, and various other forms of financial institution fraud. In 2018, Economic Crime Investigators handled 4,805 cases, made 311 total arrests and had a 17.5% clearance rate.

## Felony Response

Felony Response handles preliminary investigations of all types of crime classifications. Offenses investigated include: rape, homicide, robbery, burglary, and larceny. In 2018, Felony Response handled 4,583 calls and 837 arrests.

## Homicide

The Homicide Bureau is responsible for conducting all investigations related to homicides, suicides, and natural or accidental deaths. Memphis recorded 222 homicides in 2018. The Homicide Bureau was able to clear 72% of all homicides in 2018 which is higher than the national average.

## Missing Persons

The Missing Persons Unit handles all cases involving missing persons and runaways. During 2018, Missing Persons Investigators handled 4,192 cases. Of those cases, 1,107 were missing persons and 2,506 were runaways.

## Pawn/Scrap/Seizure

Pawn, Scrap, Seizure Unit investigates person(s) responsible for thefts of scrap metals, monitor and identify frequent pawners, recovers stolen property, assist outside agencies, and assist investigators in creating a deterrent for criminals by seizing vehicles that were used conveyance of felony crimes. Pawn, Scrap, Seizure Unit handled 141 assigned scrap cases, 383 pawn pickups, 867 items seized at value of \$502,270, and made 14 arrests during 2018. The clearance rate for the Pawn Scrap Seizure Unit's total case load was 9.92% in 2018.

Please note: Bank robberies are handled by the Safe Streets Task Force.



## Property and Evidence

Memphis Police Department Property and Evidence is operated 24 hours daily. Property and Evidence is responsible for logging and storing thousands of pieces of property that come into the possession of UAPD each year. Property may be classified as evidence connected with case investigations, search warrants, or seized as contraband.

## Sex Crimes/Juvenile Abuse

This unit is responsible for handling investigations involving any sexual or physically abusive crime. In 2018, the Sex Crimes/Juvenile Abuse Squad reviewed 1,528 total cases which included 352 rapes, 222 occurrences of forcible fondling, and 105 stalking complaints with 703 arrests made.

## Vehicle Storage

The City of Memphis Vehicle Storage is located at 465 Klink Avenue, Memphis, Tennessee. The Vehicle Storage lot operates seven (7) days a week, 24 hours per day. Vehicle Storage processes vehicles that are brought to the facility by the authority of the Memphis Police Department (MPD), the Shelby County Sheriff's Department, or Housing and Community Development (HCD). During 2018, Vehicle Storage impounded 10,572 vehicles, released 6,982 vehicles, and sold 3,565 vehicles at auction.



## Special Services

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The Memphis Police Department provides specialized police services through Special Operations. The services are not only utilized by the Memphis Police Department but also regional law enforcement agencies.

### Air Support

The Air Support Division is often utilized by MPD units and outside agencies in various types of operations. Helicopters flown by Air Support include three Bell Jet Ranger helicopters and a Eurocopter A-Star helicopter. Staffed 16 hours a day, this high flying unit handled 481 calls for service in 2018 and was instrumental in 71 arrests and handled 16 assist-other-agency calls.

### Bomb Unit

The Bomb Unit responded to 58 call outs in 2018. The Bomb Unit also participated in 34 miscellaneous incidents, 4 static displays, 18 training events.

### Canine Unit

This unit utilizes highly trained dogs who, along with their handlers, make up a unique team responsible for building searches and suspect searches, as well as narcotic and explosive detection. In 2018, the Canine Unit answered 3,597 calls, initiated 16,041 specials, made 406 felony arrests and 146 misdemeanor arrests.

### Crime Prevention

The Crime Prevention Unit was implemented in 2011 to create, organize, coordinate and manage all community-oriented and community outreach initiatives affiliated with the Memphis Police Department. The unit's largest program is the Community Outreach Program (C.O.P.). This initiative was developed utilizing the existing manpower from the former police Co-Act units. In 2018, Community Outreach Program handled 1,970 details, 1,193 program requests and 21,944 specials, made 70 felony arrests and 146 misdemeanor arrests.

### Harbor Patrol

This unit is responsible for the safety and enforcement of marine activities along the Mississippi River. The unit has three vessels in its fleet and officers assigned to the unit are responsible for ensuring daily that the vessels are ready to put into service.

### Mounted Patrol

The Mounted Patrol Unit began 2015 with a total complement of (10) officers. This number included (1) Lieutenant, (1) Sergeant, (5) Patrolman, and (1) Reserve Patrolman. Additional trained officers are: (2) additional auxiliary officers. As a unit, the Mounted Patrol officers and their 10 mounts handle community details, work patrol assignments, attend training sessions and initiate specials.

### Tact Unit

This elite unit, specially trained to respond to various emergency situations, is responsible for handling barricade situations, hostage rescues, counter terrorism, and high risk felony apprehensions. Although not subject to regular calls for service like patrol units, the Tact Unit responded to 18 radio calls, initiated 822 specials, made 6 arrests, and handled 4 barricade/hostage situations in 2018. The TACT Unit also participated in 40 VIP Security Details, 36 Community Outreach programs, and 10 gun seizures.







## Traffic

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The Traffic Division has been at 1925 Union Avenue since 1981. The Traffic Division consists of the “Special Traffic Investigation Squad” with 22 sergeants, 4 lieutenants, 2 majors, 1 Acting Lt. Colonel; the “Motorcycle Unit” with 13 patrolman, 2 lieutenants; the “DUI Unit” which has 22 patrolmen, and 3 lieutenants.

## Motors

The primary function of Motors is the enforcement of traffic laws, the investigation of crashes and the participation in special events. Motors, as well as other members of the Traffic Division, are periodically assigned as traffic control for major movies filmed in Memphis which have included the films “21 Grams”, “Hustle and Flow”, “Black Snake Moan” and “My Blueberry Nights”. Motors Officers utilize twenty-eight (27) motorcycles.

## STIS

The Special Traffic Investigations Squad (STIS) is responsible for investigating crashes involving fatalities or serious critical injuries. STIS is also responsible for investigating crashes involving citizens over the age of 85.

## DUI

The DUI Unit responds to calls in the city involving alcohol or drug related incidents. MPD DUI officers are specially trained in the testing of drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol or other drugs.



## Training Academy

The Memphis Police Academy provides training programs that vary from civilian training to basic and in-service training for commissioned officers. Basic recruit training consists of 840 hours of training that focuses on the enhancement of knowledge, skills, and proficiency in firearms, tactical and behavioral law enforcement theories necessary for the appointment to a commissioned status.

## D.A.R.E./ G.R.E.A.T.

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The D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit has continued to provide services with emphasis on “DRUGS” and “GANGS” awareness, prevention and resistance. The Office of Drug Education D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit is currently staffed with one Lieutenant, seven Officers. All officers are trained and certified in D.A.R.E. and G.R.E.A.T. The D.A.R.E. / G.R.E.A.T. curriculums were taught in (26) Fifty-six Elementary schools, and (14) eighteen middle schools.

Along with teaching the D.A.R.E. /G.R.E.A.T. curriculums, the unit held the G.R.E.A.T. Summer Day Camps, which consisted of two camps (49 participants). The camps were held Monday-Friday 8:00am to 4:00pm.

The officers were responsible for the well being and safety of the children. All of the camps concluded without incident and the officer did an outstanding job. The Office of Drug Education participated in numerous Health Fairs, Community Days, Red Ribbon Week, Career Days, and Gang presentations and displays. The D.A.R.E. /G.R.E.A.T. unit held two Citywide culminations for D.A.R.E. which consisted of (26) Twenty-nine participating schools, culminating 2,036 students. There were G.R.E.A.T. culminations and a Citywide Culmination which consisted of (18) eighteen participating schools, culminating 2,036 students.

## Information Systems

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### Mission Statement

The mission of MPD's Information Technology Division is to optimize the Department's ability to protect and serve the citizens of Memphis through the efficient and innovative use of the most advanced Information Technology (IT) available. Challenges include identifying which technologies should be incorporated to achieve the greatest public safety benefit. Responsibilities include planning, developing, implementing, and supporting the IT systems and networks throughout the Police Division.

Law enforcement requires timely and secure access to services that provide data whenever and wherever for deterring and reducing crime. The exchange of criminal justice information is governed by 28 C.F.R., part 20. The MPD Information Technology Division is responsible for this agency's compliance to the CJIS Security Policy and the Management Control Agreement.

### Accomplishments for 2018

- Information Systems migrated all MPD users from the antiquated, NT4 Memphis Police domain to a more robust CJIS compliant domain (MEM RTCC domain).
- Updated the paperless Watson reporting suite from a Windows PC platform to the Android platform that allows for greater functionality.

- Implementation of the new Cyber Watch Program
- Institute the (ACES) Automated Case Examination Service Investigative Protocol
- Added cameras to our Port Security Program
- Additional Sky Cop & Sky Watch surveillance platforms Information Systems Goals
- The Memphis Police Department will deploy a Law Enforcement Event Video Documentation (LEEVD) System Solution. The LEEVD System will be comprised of recording equipment mounted on the vehicle, In-Car (ICV); worn on the officer, Body Worn Camera (BWC); and, equipment to document the spatial and physical characteristics of the vehicle, Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL); the data storage facilities; and, the backend software application to securely categorize, manage, retrieve, share and archive the video evidence and related data collected during Memphis Police Department (MPD) activities.
