LETTER FROM THE CHIEF

I am pleased to present the Memphis Police Department's 2022 Annual Report. This year we continued to listen to our community stakeholders and responding to their needs in three primary pillars: Reducing Crime, Community Engagement, and Organizational Effectiveness. As we continue to face retirements and separations, we must also direct our attention on the recruitment and retention of police officers and professional staff support. The work of public safety employees can come with much trauma, stress, and anxiety. Therefore, our attention has been intentionally focused on employee wellness and effectively responding to trauma that effects our community.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2022, despite the impact that COVID-19 had on the country, the city of Memphis experienced a significant reduction in crime compared to 2021. While the effect of the virus continued to loom, the men and women of the Memphis Police Department remained focused on the arduous task of reducing crime in the most distressed communities.

Our Strategic Plan is a living document that is reevaluated every quarter to ensure we remain focused on the myriad of initiatives implemented throughout the department. Our plan was developed through brainstorming sessions with department personnel, listening to community stakeholders, and meeting with numerous city officials.

REDUCE CRIME

Reduce crime and the perception of crime through innovative strategies and community engagement.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Work together with our partners to build trust and the capacity of community organizations to take the lead in improving public safety.

ORGANIZATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

Create an environment that maximizes the effectiveness of the Memphis Police Department and its employees.

We attributed much of our success in crime reduction to restructuring our department's CompStat Process. CompStat is a performance management system used by police departments to track crime and related quality of life issues. We also reevaluated the deployment of our Field Operations, ensuring personnel in Uniform Patrol were assigned where and when they were needed most. In addition, the MPD created a Fugitive Unit to focus on apprehending the most violent wanted offenders still at large. Through regular and collaborative operations, this new unit began to reduce the fugitive backlog of thousands of wanted felons. We increased personnel assigned to our Motorcycle Unit, added 15 officers to our Downtown Entertainment District Unit (EDU), and added personnel to the Strategic Traffic Enforcement Unit (STEU) to address the numerous concerns related to speeding and reckless driving in our city.

Crime Analysis Crime Stoppers Inspectional Services is made up of the Internal Affairs Squad and the Security Squad. Inspectional Services conducts all internal investigations involving police personnel, as well as, other sensitive investigations. Officers assigned to these units are appointed by the Director of Police and are considered to be highly experienced investigators. In 1996, the offices of Internal Affairs and Security Squad were relocated to the 100 North Main building, Suite 2220, in downtown Memphis. In December of 2006, IAB and Security Squad were moved once again to the corner of Poplar and Union Extended.

PURPOSE OF INTERNAL AFFAIRS

The purpose of the Internal Affairs Squad is to define responsibilities and establish procedures for sworn members of this department for dealing with observed or reported allegations of misconduct. Internal Affairs investigates all complaints lodged against police personnel. These complaints can range from verbal abuse to brutality. The majority of these complaints fall under three categories: Personal Conduct, Use of Force and Arrest, and Duty Performance.

PURPOSE OF SECURITY SQUAD

The Security Squad investigates all shooting incidents involving police officers and any complaints regarding possible criminal misconduct against employees. These investigations include accusations against officers, city employees from various departments, and other administrative investigations. The Security Squad is also responsible for teaching Deadly Force lectures at the Training Academy for new police recruits and during In-Service Training for veteran officers. Their Deadly Force lecture is also part of the training received by all citizens enrolled in the Citizen's Police Academy.



INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

The Investigative Services branch of the Memphis Police Department is responsible for thoroughly reviewing the details surrounding every crime committed in Memphis. Investigative Services work closely with all branches of the Memphis Police Department and other law enforcement agencies to solve crime.

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATION

The Crime Scene Investigation Unit is a full-time operational unit responsible for conducting on-site investigations at the scenes of violent crimes (homicides, sex crimes, robberies, aggravated assaults, and missing persons), and property crimes (burglaries, auto thefts, and thefts or destruction of property over \$10,000). CSI also handles any follow-up investigative requests for which CSI services are needed to process, collect, preserve, package, transport, analyze, and document physical and/or trace evidence that will assist in the successful investigation and prosecution of offenders committing crimes in Memphis. CSI is a support unit to all bureaus within Investigative Services and provides training to regional law enforcement personnel in the area of crime scene investigations.

For the year 2022, the most significant accomplishment for the Latent Print Office was the completion of 6,882 latent cases despite facing significant staffing challenges. This achievement was made possible by the expertise and dedication of the latent print examiners, who upheld the high professional standards expected by the Department.

A major result of these efforts was the identification of 3,107 individual finger and palm prints (hits). These identifications provided critical solvability for numerous cases across the Department and assisted local, state, and federal courts in prosecuting diverse and complex cases.

The Latent Print Unit's expertise was also sought by various outside agencies to render opinions, evaluations, and examinations on cases that could not be addressed elsewhere. Notably, assistance was provided to the Tennessee Innocence Project in re-evaluating fingerprint cases dating back to the 1990s. Findings from these cases were forwarded to the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation and the Criminal Courts for the State of Tennessee.

ECONOMIC CRIMES

The Economic Crimes Bureau is responsible for the investigation and prosecution of individuals involved in felony crimes. Crimes investigated include forgeries, counterfeit checks, counterfeit credit and debit cards, computer fraud, insurance fraud, and various other forms of financial institution fraud. In 2022, Economic Crime Investigators handled 4,667 cases, made 332 total arrests and had a 17.78% clearance rate.

FELONY RESPONSE

Felony Response handles preliminary investigations of all types of crime classifications. Offenses investigated include: rape, homicide, robbery, burglary, and larceny. In 2022, Felony Response handled 3,236 calls, 3,044 investigations, and 2,176 arrests.

HOMICIDE

The Homicide Bureau of the Memphis Police Department investigated 399 cases in 2022, including 304 homicides—250 criminal homicides and 33 justifiable homicides. The Bureau also handled 2,877 cases covering suicides, natural deaths, attempted suicides, and unknown deaths. With a 68% clearance rate, the Bureau exceeded the national average of 52.3% reported by the FBI for 2022. Investigators resolved 208 homicides from 2022 and 19 from previous years, reflecting their "no case left behind" approach. The Bureau made 116 arrests, including 56 gang-affiliated suspects, and solved 10 cases from 2022 and 9 older cases as new evidence emerged.

The Homicide Bureau remains dedicated to achieving a clearance rate above the national average through thorough investigations and collaboration with local and federal agencies.

PAWN/SCRAP/SEIZURE

Pawn, Scrap, Seizure Unit investigates person(s) responsible for thefts of scrap metals, monitor and identify frequent pawners, recovers stolen property, assist outside agencies, and assist investigators in creating a deterrent for criminals by seizing vehicles that were used conveyance of felony crimes. Pawn, Scrap, Seizure Unit handled 123 assigned scrap cases, 144 pawn pickups, 434 items seized at value of \$310,399, and made 11 arrests during 2022.

PROPERTY AND EVIDENCE

The Memphis Police Department Property & Evidence Division processed 27,523 evidence numbers and tagged 111,565 items in 2022. Among these, 10,368 items were released to owners or authorized individuals. Narcotics-related evidence included 3,609 pounds and 4,100 milliliters of substances, along with 22,906 narcotic dosage units and 524 planted narcotics cases. Firearms tagged totaled 7,305, comprising 152 air guns, 6,356 handguns, 622 rifles, 173 shotguns, and 1 destructive device. Additionally, the division conducted 7 auctions, where 1,402 items were sold, and organized 2 general inventory destructions, resulting in the disposal of 662 items. The division destroyed 757 narcotic items weighing 4,965 pounds and transferred over \$2.18 million to the Organized Crime Unit and other entities, reflecting their commitment to efficient evidence management.

QUALITY ASSURANCE UNIT

The mission of the Quality Assurance Unit is to effectively review and properly classify memos, review unfounded and exceptionally cleared incidents, and assist bureaus with report validation. They also ensure that The Memphis Police Department is properly reporting incidents under TIBRS and NIBRS standards. The Quality Assurance Unit reviewed, verified, and or corrected 14,009 TIBRS errors in 2022.

SEX CRIMES/JUVENILE ABUSE

This unit is responsible for handling investigations involving any sexual or physically abusive crime. In 2022, the Sex Crimes/Juvenile Abuse Squad reviewed 1,527 total cases which included 249 rapes, 173 occurrences of forcible fondling, and 99 stalking complaints.

VIOLENT CRIMES UNIT

The Violent Crimes Unit will work within the jurisdiction of the City of Memphis to conduct investigations relative to the following carjacking offenses, robbery-individual with vehicle taken offenses, interstate shooting offenses, serial crimes involving acts of violence, and any investigation at the request of the MPD Command Staff. The Violent Crimes Unit investigated 427 cases resulting in 480 physical arrests consisting of 1500 felony charges and 239 misdemeanor charges. The Violent Crimes Unit clearing 207 of 427 Carjackings for a 48.48% clearance rate, 119 of 270 Robbery-Individual with Vehicle Taken for a 44.07% clearance rate, and 13 of 92 Interstate Shootings for a 14.13% clearance rate.



DUI

DUI Unit responds to calls in the city involving alcohol or related crashes. DUI Officers are especially trained in the investigations of drivers suspected of being under the influence of alcohol or other substances.

PST

Police Service Technician (PST) is an entry level position of the Memphis Police Department. PSTs primarily handle crash investigations, issue non-moving traffic citations, recover stolen vehicles, and act as support personnel. They do not carry weapons or respond to crime scenes unless called to do so in a traffic enforcement capacity.

MOTORS

Motors primary function is the enforcement of traffic laws, assist in investigation of critical crash scenes, investigate minor crash scenes, assist with Special Events, and Dignitary Escorts. Motors have served in unique roles for security and crowd control for

special assignments for Hollywood productions such as 21 Grams, Hustle and Flow, Black Snake Moan, and My Blueberry Nights.

STIS

Special Traffic Investigation Squad is responsible for investigating crashes involving fatal or critical injuries. STIS conducts investigative functions by serving to assist MPD bureaus when called up and relentless investigations of Hit and Run suspects. STIS also investigate the crashes of elderly over the age of 85.

SPECIAL SERVICES

The Memphis Police
Department provides
specialized police services
through Special Operations.
The services are not only
utilized by the Memphis Police
Department but also regional
law enforcement agencies.

AIR SUPPORT

The Air Support Division is often utilized by MPD units and outside agencies in various types of operations. In 2022, the Memphis Police Department's Air Support Unit responded to 712 service calls, conducted searches for missing persons, suspects, and vehicles, and assisted in the arrests of more than 192 individuals involved in serious felonies, including carjacking, homicide, and aggravated assault.

BOMB UNIT

The Bomb Unit responded to 39 callouts in 2022. The Bomb Unit also participated in 41 security surveys, 18 static displays, and 188 training events.

CANINE UNIT

This unit utilizes highly trained dogs who, along with their handlers, make up a unique team responsible for building searches and suspect searches, as well as narcotic and explosive detection. In 2022, the Canine Unit answered 2,849 calls, initiated 8,198 specials, and made 149 arrests.

HARBOR PATROL

This unit is responsible for the safety and enforcement of marine activities along the Mississippi River. The unit has three vessels in its fleet and officers assigned to the unit are responsible for ensuring daily that the vessels are ready to put into service. During 2022, the officers assigned to the Harbor Patrol handled 35 calls, 14 searches, 157 citations issued, handled 9 boat assist, and 1,214 specials.

MOUNTED PATROL

The Mounted Patrol Unit began 2022 with a total compliment of (6) officers. This number included (1) Lieutenant, (4) Patrolman, and (1) Reserve Patrolmen. As a unit, the Mounted Patrol officers and their 10 mounts handled 13 arrests, 298 citations, 86 community details, worked 158 patrol assignments, attended 119 training sessions and initiated 3,432 specials.

RESERVE OFFICERS

The Memphis Police Reserve Division was formed in 1968 due to the critical shortage of law enforcement manpower; budget restrictions and a need to help hold back the surge of crime inflicted upon the citizens of this community. Reserve Officers are still upholding the proud tradition of service to our community. The total number of 194 reserves worked 27,787 total hours for the year 2022.

TACT UNIT

This elite unit, specially trained to respond to various emergency situations, is responsible for handling barricade situations, hostage rescues, counter-terrorism, and high risk felony apprehensions. Although not subject to regular calls for service like patrol units, the Tact Unit responded to 39 radio calls, initiated 943 specials, made 5 arrests, issued 79 tickets, and handled 4 barricade/hostage situations in 2022. The TACT Unit also participated in 180 VIP Security Details, and 10 gun seizures.



TRAINING ACADEMY

The Memphis Police Academy provides training programs that vary from civilian training to basic and in-service training for commissioned officers. Basic recruit training consists of 940 hours of training. This training focuses on enhancing knowledge, skills, and proficiency in firearms, and tactical and behavioral law enforcement training necessary for the appointment to a commissioned peace officer in Tennessee.

EMPLOYMENT UNIT

In 2022, the Employment Unit of the Memphis Police

Department's Training Academy – a nationally recognized CALEA (Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies) Academy) – coordinated recruitment, application processing, entrylevel testing, and background investigations relative to the hiring of Memphis Police Recruits, Police Service Technicians and other agencies at the request of the Chief of Police or designee.

Working as a team, the unit successfully contributed to the hiring objectives and goals of the Memphis Police Department and the City of Memphis. As a result, the unit made great strides that led to outstanding accomplishments in 2023.

Accomplishments achieved include, but are not limited to the following, whereas:

- A new Recruiting plan was developed and implemented to attract qualified prospects to become Memphis Police Officers and Police Service Technicians.
- The Recruiting Team continued the "Join the Best in Blue" recruitment efforts to expand its reach and retention of qualified police recruit and police service technician candidates to join the Memphis Police Department.
- The Recruiting Team utilized social media, radio ads and interviews, billboards, television commercials, and The Memphis Police Department's website to market and disseminate recruitment information.
- The Recruiting Team attended 24 community events, 29 recruiting events, conducted approximately 15 radio recruiting interviews, and hosted four hiring expos at the Departments' headquarters.
- Recruiting flyers were posted in department stations, libraries, churches, colleges & universities, military bases, shopping malls, and civic organizations.
- 2,103 police recruit applications were submitted. 284 police service technician applications were submitted. The Background Investigation Team accepted and processed a combined total of 606 background investigations and records requests.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of MPD's Information Technology Division is to optimize the Department's ability to protect and serve the citizens of Memphis through the efficient and innovative use of the most advanced Information Technology (IT) available. Challenges include identifying which technologies should be incorporated to achieve the greatest public safety benefit. Responsibilities include planning, developing, implementing, and supporting the IT systems and networks throughout the Police Division.

Law enforcement requires timely and secure access to services that provide data whenever and wherever for deterring and reducing crime. The exchange of criminal justice information is governed by 28 C.F.R., part 20. The MPD Information Technology Division is responsible for this agency's compliance to the CJIS Security Policy and the Management Control Agreement.

2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Installed in-dash ICV builds for new fleet, increasing the total number of ICV systems installed to 779 vehicles.
- Completed issuance of the Body III body worn camera to all precincts and specialized units.
- Hired 1 full-time Database Administrator.
- The RTCC Tele-serve unit has taken 4,922 telephonic reports saving uniform patrol over 4,000-man hours.
- Continued progress towards replacement of the citywide Radio System to Motorola.
- Citizen online reporting (DORs) has been purchased and is in the final stages of review prior to release.
- In process to consolidate body-worn cameras (BWCs) and in-car video (ICV) under one vendor; thereby, simplifying the capture and classification of video and the evidentiary process. As part of the amended contract, successfully negotiated for interview rooms and drones to be added as part of the enterprise solution.

CRIME PREVENTION

The Crime Prevention Unit was implemented in 2011 to create, organize, coordinate and manage all communityoriented and community outreach initiatives affiliated with the Memphis Police Department. The unit's largest program is the Community Outreach Program (C.O.P.). This initiative was developed utilizing the existing manpower from the former police Co-Act units. Its restructuring better serves the community relative to community policing and the reduction of juvenile violence.

2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Citizens Police Academy

The Citizens Police Academy educates residents on police work and fosters partnerships, graduating 130 citizens in 2022.

Clergy Police Academy

The Clergy Police Academy trains faith leaders in law enforcement collaboration, with 499 graduates to date.

Boxing Program

The Boxing Program teaches youth fitness, discipline, and respect, producing annual competition winners, including two Golden Gloves winners in 2022.

Memphis Youth Crime Watch

The Memphis Youth Crime Watch empowers students to combat school crime, with 964 attending its 2018 conference.

National Faith and Blue

The National Faith and Blue initiative strengthens police-community relations, hosting 44 events in 2022.

School Supply Drive

The School Supply Drive provided 500 backpacks with supplies at MPD's 2022 back-to-school event.

Memphis Girls Rock

The Memphis Girls Rock program empowers girls with resources and speakers, with 1,600 attendees in 2019.

COP's Annual Black History Knowledge Bowl

The COP's Annual Black History Knowledge Bowl educated 122 youth in 2022 on African-American contributions.

Feed the Needy

Feed the Needy, supported by MPD, provided food to 3,900 families during Thanksgiving 2022.

Memphis Park and Recreation Community Centers

MPD supports community centers and pools with safety coverage, events, and a food pantry in collaboration with COP.

"Outside the Box"

A summer youth boxing program teaching fundamentals, self-discipline, and conflict resolution with participation from professional fighters.

Ride Outside the Box

A bike safety program for students aged 8-17, focusing on bike repair, safety rules, and promoting self-esteem.

M.E.M.P.H.I.S. Summer Camp

This camp engages about 50 youth annually with fun activities and educational sessions promoting positive life choices.

ORGANIZED CRIME UNIT

The Organized Crime Unit of the Memphis Police Department is assigned the primary responsibility for investigative and control of organized crime, vice, and narcotics related offenses within the Department's jurisdiction. The Unit is multi-faceted and actively participates in multi-jurisdictional task forces to coordinate the attack on illegal activities at the local, state, and federal levels.

The D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit has continued to provide services with emphasis on "DRUGS" and "GANGS" awareness, prevention and resistance. The Office of Drug Education D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit is currently staffed with one supervisor, five officers. All officers are trained and certified in D.A.R.E. and G.R.E.A.T.

VICE

The D.A.R.E./G.R.E.A.T. Unit served 13 elementary schools, reaching 892 students, and six middle schools, graduating 1,292 students. They hosted a four-week G.R.E.A.T. summer camp for about 100 kids and completed over 100 additional programs, including Red Ribbon Reading, after-school mentoring, MPD Hiring Expos, car shows, back-to-school events, drug and bullying presentations, graduations, D.A.R.E. displays, career days, toy drives, student interventions, and parades.
